The RCAP categories include: Sustainable Communities and Transportation Planning, and Energy and Fuel. The City is also part of the Florida Sustainability Directors Network (FSDN), Southeast Sustainability Directors Network (USDN), where we exchange lessons learned and work together on programs and policy development.
